Small Christian Community in the Korean Catholic Church Centered on SCC National Committee in 2001-2003

1. Background

- (1) Since the early 1990's the Korean Catholic Church has endeavored to evangelize through SCC. During this time, the pastoral collaboration among Dioceses became indispensible. Seoul Archdiocese together with Masan diocese prepared for the first Korean National Assembly right after the AsIPA General Assembly II in 2000.
- (2) In 2001, the first National Assembly was held and representatives of each Dioceses decided to continue this meeting at national level so as to share and learn from each diocese's pastoral experience in relation to SCC ministry. For this, they requested the setting up of a SCC sub-committee in the Catholic Bishop's Conference of Korea.
- (3) On Nov. 23rd, 2001, the Committee for Evangelization in the Catholic Bishops Conference of Korea made a decision to help collaborate with SCC among the dioceses and internationally, and to established a SCC sub-committee in the Committee for Evangelization.
- (4) In the 2nd National Assembly 2002, for evangelization with and by SCC the participants pooled opinions on how to foster closer relations among dioceses and parishes, and how promote pastoral relationships with Asian Churches, and to deepen study on helping SCC to grow.
- (5) Finally on Feb. 15, 2002, SCC National Committee started to work officially, replacing the previous body of representatives made up of Pastoral Directors for the Laity and other assistants.
- (6) At present the SCC National Committee has a 'Research team' which aids the Committee various theological and pastoral studies to deepen and develop SCC.

2. Goal

To contribute to building an evangelical community of "communion" by improving the collaboration and communication between parishes and dioceses in relation to SCC, by

seeking out good pastoral models and programs of SCC, and by doing pastoral and theological study.

The First SCC National Assembly Declaration

"You must strengthen your brothers" (Luke 22, 32)

I. A seed of Hope

- In this new millenium, 150 representatives of lay people, religious, priests and bishops from 11 dioceses gathered together and had this assembly to actualize evangelization through SCC from June 25, 2001 to June 27, 2001.
- 2. The Korean Catholic Church has promoted SCC since the 1990s' for the evangelization of the Church and the world. From the start we longed for the inter-communication and collaboration of dioceses. From the moment of attending the AsIPA General Assembly II held by FABC, the Korean Church felt a need for collaboration and systematic cooperation among dioceses and made a decision to have meetings at the national level.

3. Praying in the name of the Lord we shared the joy, happiness, hope, sorrow and pain experienced by the people of the dioceses and parishes in the process of developing SCC. We imagine that this SCC national assembly can be a see of hope which we sow now will grow big and become a beautiful tree in which every bird can rest and sing.

II. SCC and the Korean Catholic Church

- 4. The Korean Church has developed very rapidly in numbers and size, but the distance between faith and life is getting wider; moreover, the Church does not practive well enough the role of light and salt to the world. Because of this, with SCC we want to begin a new evangelization and communion and do our best to assist the role of the Church.
- 5. We are striving for a Church composed of SCCs which in the context of daily life itself listen to God and follow God's words. That reflects the early Church(Acts. 2,42-47), this 'Communities of communion spoken of by Vatican Council II and the Communion of communities' endorsed by the Asian bishops.

III. Our Faith and Prospect

- 6. We shared the experience of ministry in communion, and tasted the fruitful vitality which the risen Christ grants us. Furthermore, we are encouraged by the hopeful saying that "We know that all things work for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose"(Romans. 8,28) Even though those who work for the growth of the Heavenly Kingdom might face all kinds of difficulties and agony, we firmly believe that through Christ our encouragement overflows"(II Cor. 1,5), and that the Holy Spirit will lead us.
- 7. We realized that we are brothers and sisters giving strength to each other in Christ; therefore, we will endeavor to spread and strengthen SCC in the Korean Church.
- 8. For evangelization through SCC, we will reinforce the solidarity of dioceses and parishes, and continue to have meetings for information exchange and collaboration.

All you Martyred Saints of Korea, help us to perceive your invitation to live in Christ, and pray for evangelization in our country.

The Second SCC National Assembly Declaration

"Get up, Let us go" (John 14,31)

1. Nurturing the Spout of the Hope

Last year. we had the First SCC meeting at the national level. We agreed to the idea that "The community of the Communion of Small Christian Communities" is the way that the Korean Catholic Church will have to go in the future, and that only the community will give a living hope to the world and the Church. We decided that we would have a regular meeting to promote the communion and the collaboration of parishes and diocese. That is why we gathered again in the Chung Ha Sang Education Center from July 1, 2002, to July 3, 2002. We of 12 dioceses are 5 bishops, 52 priests, 23 Religious, and 139 Lay people.

Looking back over last year, we saw lots of transition to SCC centered ministry in various secondary stations, parishes, dioceses, and shared brotherly interchange and collaboration beyond these boundaries. These facts assured us that we are branches of one vine-Christ. Furthermore the establishment of SCC sub-committee in the Committee for Evangelization fo Catholic Bishop's Conference showed us that the seed we sowed is finally sprouting. We believe that the One who makes the seed sprout and grow is the Lord, our God(cf. I Cor. 3,6).

2. The Church is Communion

God the Trinity is the foundation of community; therefore, man created in the imafe of God is called to live in community. Likewise the building-up of community is a participation in the creative work of God.

The Church is God's people invited to live the Trinitarian Communion of God. The Church-God's people is the community is the place of communion where the Church actualizes her essence and transmits the love of God to people. We look to SCC because we believe that we can concretely actualize the Church as community in our modern society.

In this meeting, we willingly shared various experiences and tried to rediscover the essence of the Church, and encouraged each other by hearing lived experiences of SCC. This meeting helped us to get a clearer picture of the possibility of SCC development in the Korean Catholic Church. Also, we sought ways to promote cooperation and development between SCC and other apostolic groups.

3. At the Heart of SCC is the World.

The core of SCC is life being transformed by the Gospel. In SCC, the faithful are nourished and empowered to continued renewal and transformation by the Word of God. Gathering with the Word of the risen Lord, they pray with one heart and encourage each other, while striving each way to take their outlook on life from the Gospel. Gospel sharing in SCC helped us to get closer to the Word. "Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?"(Luke 24,32)

4. SCC is the place of "together-with" ministry.

The Church is the sacrament of salvation for the world and asks the laity to actively participate in the mission of the Church. Presentation of SCC experience assured us that the faithful could lead apostolic ministry through SCC. SCC is a school that helps the laity listen to the Word of God and practive it spontaneously. SCC is a place of 'together-with' ministry that educates clergy, religious and lay people to learn new roles and leadership skills.

5. Challenges and Resolutions

Nowadays, the Korean Catholic Church is faced with various challenges of the times: day by day increasing materialism, the growing gap between rich and poor, severe individualism and severance of relationships with others, breaking up of families, lack of respect for life, separation of the country etc. One more task for the Church is to overcome the secularization of the Church by the secular outlook not to mention the mission of the Church to evangelize the world.

Facing these challenges we hope SCC will be a leaven for the evangelization of the world. For evangelization through SCC we will increase brotherly exchange between dioceses

and parishes, and continue pastor an exchange with Asian Churches. We will deepen the pastoral and theological study to help SCC grow.

To love our Father in heaven and to put what He ordered us to do into practive let us "Get up, and Let us go (John 14,31) out into the vineyard of the Lord.

It ran three times at the diocesan level in three different steps. 476 participants in the first step, 288 in the second step, and 370 in the third step have already completed this program.

2. Program Development

- (1) 'Guidance' for spiritual growth in SCCs : Textbooks for SCCs have been completely reorganized since March 2003.
- (a) The necessity of reorganization

"The 7 Steps of Sharing the gospel" has been used extensively to revitalize the SCCs in parishes, districts, and sections.

The 7 Steps of the SCC originates from biblical teachings and can be found in the monthly publication "Guidance". Guidance can be used at home, in the work place, or wherever Christians gather to worship as well as within SCCs. It can also be used by anyone without outside assistance because it is self-explanatory and simple to use.

(b) 7 Programs outline

☐ First Stage: Gospel sharing

We can provide the 7 Steps consistently in addition to meditation of the Gospels on Sunday, so that the faithful can learn from the teachings and share their life experiences.

□ Second Stage: Finding God in our life.
This program is adapted from "Amos Gospel sharing", a guide for the faithful to discern
and practice Christian virtues according to the Lord's will by seeing the world through
God's eyes.
☐ Third Stage: my story, the story of a picture
Christian art forms (sculptures, painting, etc.) have the ability to encourage the faithful and
increase interest in their faith. By creating a more devout atmosphere within the church,
the faithful will be able to appreciate more deeply the divine inspiration,
captured within the work of art.
This allows them to develop a deeper appreciation for the Gospel and share their
feelings of faith.
□ Fourth Stage: Sharing the experiences of faith
This program helps the faithful increase their love and understanding for their
neighbors, and promote mature Christian belief.
The faithful can share the experiences they have experienced in the course of their life
with God as well as the fruits obtained from meditating upon the virtues of God's word
□ Fifth Stage: The Spiritual journey in our life
This program is designed to lead the faithful toward meditating on the Word.
The faithful can learn how to meditate in depth under the guidance of spiritual leaders.
□ Sixth Stage: Bible study with SCCs
This program is organized to help the faithful study the Bible and make it a part of their
daily lives.
□ Seventh Stage: Gospel game for SCCs
The activities will provide a format for the faithful to grow in God's word and maintain
productive relationships with other the faithful by developing a Bible-oriented program
within the SCCs.
(2) "Our Journey Together"
(a) The necessity of reorganizing "Our Journey Together"
We used the "Our Journey Together" Lumko publisher(First Edition, 1995) as a
textbook. It was originally designed to be a two-year educational program. However, we
found that the Lumko program did not adequately harmony with the way doctrine
was being taught in the Korean church. As a result, we have developed our own 28-
chaper textbook with a corresponding educational program that is designed to cover a 7
to 8 month period. We feel this program better meets the needs of the churches in Korea.

Seoul Archdiocese: teenager Ministry

Reporting on the 'YMC'

This report is to give an explanation how the CYA was started in Korea and to offer detailed information about CYA in Korea to others.

The background of the birth of the CYA

In 1996, in the midst of an atmosphere in which the importance of youth education clearly emerged, the youth leaders from parishes with YMC(Youth mini community) were given a youth formation program while we were applying ROL(Review of Life) method to parish youth group.

After a number of youth meetings and training programs, we concluded that it is necessary to have more training programs and education for the wider range of youth.

As a result, with the endorsement from a bishop of Seoul Arch-diocese, the CYA, a diocesan youth organization was initiated in the 3rd Seoul Youth Day in September, 2000. All the youth in Seoul Arch-diocese were allowed for the membership. Currently, the 4th president is in the office.

2. The goal of the CYA movement

Being grateful for being called to Catholic faith, the member of CYA is to yearn for friendship among young people, to make parish, district, diocese community a little God's kingdom and to introduce all the youth to ideals mentioned above.

The objective of the CYA

Through ROL methodology, the CYA aims youth group mobilized by Catholic youth actively and voluntarily.

4. Application of ROL

In the beginning, 13 parishes of Seoul Arch-diocese began to use ROL. They were the model parishes to do catechism and sharing through ROL. YMC parishes conveyed this method to students using the guidebooks designed by the youth office. In the year 2000, the 5th year of experiment, those youth groups became guite matured and independent.

Afterward, the method of ROL and sharing was expanded to all the other parishes in the diocese. Instead of the previous traditional catechism class, students do ROL in their religion class in Sunday school.

5. Members

If they want all the young people of Seoul Arch-diocese belong to the CYA.

(But we made a level.: Full member, contact member)

6. Active core group members

The committee in diocese is to be a core group. Each parishes elect parish delegates. Parish delegates elect district leaders. Among district leaders, the president of diocese is to be elected. There are 50-60 members working as this core group members.

7. Activities in the CYA

Basically, most activities of the CYA take place at parish levels.

□ The parish leader of the CYA is in charge of leading regular meetings(using ROL methodology) and organizing programs of youth gathering and youth camp. The ordinary members of the CYA participate in Sunday school which is constructed on the ROL methodology, assist the parish leader and animate the movement in their parish.

☐ The members working at diocesan level and district level become subjects in diocesan events. They visit and encourage each districts. Being the members of diocesan committee, these young people plan and steer the various youth activities.

Depending on a given status and role, each members of the CYA have different space and content of activities.

8. Curriculum of the CYA training programs

Monthly formation program and the extended training program held three times a year are the fundamental elements of formation programs.

Young students are supposed to get training programs according to appropriate steps. Each program has its unique quality which is nevery overlapped with other programs.

9. CYA program, the content of youth events.

- c. Being trained to get the required skills of parish leaders

Seoul Archdiocese: Youth Ministry

Reporting on the Youth SCCs (Focused in 2001)

- 1. Small Christian Community is an alternative plan.
- (1) Can transform youth from an activity centered to a Christ centered life.
- (2) Can embrace youth who are non-practicing, and alienated from others.
- (3) Can give consolation and promote intimacy through sharing.
- (4) Can practice the spirit of the Vatican Council a more horizontal system of relationships which is more free and equal than the vertical system.
- (5) Can evangelize the world through meditation and practice.

2. Small Christian Community Youth, Hurdles

- (2) Many of Youth SCC turn the group into a chance to socialize.
- (3) Frightened to separate from the intimacy of a SCC group.
- (4) No interests in the Church program.

- (9) Lack of responsibility for the group in the parish.

3. For Small Christian Community Youth

Given these problems, we recommended the following. First of all, a new mind set "SCC is not a program for the activation of the Church, it is life itself".

- (1) SCC is not meant as an effective management program to control Youth. It helps to build a fruitful christian community.
- (2) Help Youth to accept and live out the 4 core compositions of SCC.
- (3) See SCC as a life itself, not just a program. It is the pst, future, and present of the Church.

- (4) Priests and Religious try to integrate move with the wilder church community.
- (5) Transform outlook of seeing youth as companions on the journey of life, encourage a moves horizontal way of relating.
- (6) The Archdiocese needs to prepare an ongoing education programs and also follow up these courses.





- (1) main achievements
- (a) cooperative spirit: We can not lead a religious life by ourselves alone. The cooperative spirit is becoming better in sharing everyday affairs and acting together.
- (b) getting a taste for gospels: We have got used to Words in sharing gospels, and the words be helpful to life.
- (c) satisfying the sense of belongings and relationship: There are many people who had left their native places and are living in foreign lands now influenced by the Industrial Age. Although one wants to be free individually, he feels dispossession and insecurity in the modern society. Small Christian Communities let believers get the sense of belongings and relationship.

(2) difficulties encountered

- (a) lack of knowledge about the nature of the church and no sense of being at stake: We have to regain the original figure of the church. We are lack of understanding about the present figure of the church which comes to be individualized and fat, which makes much more cold-hearted believers to Catholic church, so it is difficult for us to preach the gospel to people and to do missionary works.
- (b) in discord with other apostle groups: Lay believers have already got used to the religious life groups-oriented. When the church stresses the need of Small Christian Communities to these people too much, apostle groups will feel to be neglected on the one hand and it was not easy for Small Christian Communities to get entries on the other hand.

- (c) halfness of the church being short of men: Most of members of Small Christian Communities are consist of women. Men want to participate. We are encouraging to make men participants Small Christian Communities.
- (d) We have to make lay believers's awareness improve through educations but there are limits to do it by dioceses. It is necessary to be done by each church unit.

3. plans for the future

- (1) pastoral directions
 - (a) organization of the expert committee for Section Small Christian Communities units: Now we have organized the diocese expert committee, but there is a limit to activities. It is necessary to organize the section expert committees more and more, and let them play an important role.
- (b) activating the steering members of the churches unit and fixing it: The church unit steering members who completed courses of Small Christian Communities seminars from the diocese should have their own social gatherings and take an active parts.
- (c) fixing the weekly regular meeting: It is a general tendency to have a meeting monthly, but it needs to encourage to multiply meetings by two in a month or one weekly.
- (d) making and sending in the Small Christian Communities report yearly: There is no report to be made and sent in about Small Christian Communities meetings now. It is necessary for the Small Christian Communities unit to make the reports of meetings, details, numbers of times, and actual results to the churches unit, and the churches units have to arrange them and send in them to the diocese yearly.

(2) practical activities

- (a) conducting the study and training for the members of sections' quarterly: There is no meeting of church unit Small Christian Communities representatives now. So the interchange of informations about meetings and activities is in operation by the church unit itself. It needs to get an opportunity to gain courage and to be brought up through the section or the diocese representative's meetings.
- (b) educations of Small Christian Communities step by step: There is no change and variation in contents of educations for the members of Small Christian Communities and it was so monotonous for years. It is necessary to prepare ability educations in order to grow Communities continually.

Mission station pastor partners' meeting, 'small Christian community section' introduction

(1) Mission station pastor partners' meeting, 'working with'

Kwangju diocese has been continuously concerned about the mission station pastor because many mission stations, small churches, are located in a rural and fishing area in Kwangju. Additionally, presidents of mission committees, lay missionaries and religious have been in various and worthy activities as assistants of a priest in parish for the mission station pastor. Those people living in a mission station began to have a meeting to consider this special pastor with priests related with mission station pastor in 1999. We call this, 'mission station pastor partners' meeting'.

(2) Small Christian community section

'Mission station pastor partners' meeting' is divided into several sections and one of them is 'small Christian community section'. (the 1st meeting was on October, 17, 1999). This 'small Christian community section' has only continued to meet so far. They had a 17th meeting in May 2002. The participating members of the 'small Christian community section' are originally about 15, but the average members of attendance are 7-10.
